Conference Statement

Competing Claims: Division and Coalitions. The city of Baltimore has been dubbed the “city of neighborhoods.” Seventy-two designated historic districts exist that have been traditionally occupied by distinct ethnic groups. Baltimore’s inner harbor was once the second leading port of entry for immigrants to the United States and a major manufacturing site. The streets form a unique grid pattern lined with tens of thousands of brick and formstone faced rowhouses where people have been creating an identity with ardor and conviction since the city’s beginnings. Baltimore’s citizens have formed strong coalitions and clashed in opposition to established values.

Historically, Baltimore has been a volatile and challenging location in which to live. The Second Continental Congress met there, making Baltimore the Capitol of the United States from December 1776 to February 1777. The city is about to celebrate the 200th anniversary of the Battle of Baltimore during the War of 1812. After burning Washington DC, the British attacked Baltimore the night of September 13, 1814. US forces stationed at Fort McHenry successfully defended the city’s harbor. From the bow of a British ship where he was negotiating the release of an American prisoner, Francis Scott Key, a Maryland lawyer, witnessed the battle and later wrote the poem, “The Star Spangled Banner,” which was to be set to music and named the national anthem of the United States. The Baltimore Riot of 1861 was led by Confederate sympathizers, resulting in Baltimore’s occupation by northern troops stationed there to prevent Baltimore’s secession from the Union. A traditionally working class port town, the workers rose up in the Great Railroad Strike of 1877. In 1904 the Great Baltimore Fire burned more than seventy blocks to the ground. The Black population, growing to nearly 50 percent, and presently 64%, staged the Baltimore Riot of 1968 after the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Baltimore is a city of firsts. From a long list, Baltimore has had the first--post office system in the US, general meeting of the Quakers, water company, sugar refinery, Sunday newspaper in America, investment banking house, electric refrigerator, hydrogen gas illuminated streets, Catholic seminary, canning of oysters, national nominating convention for President of the US, dental college in the world, public supported high schools for girls, telegraph line, ice cream freezer, Jewish Community Center, YMCA, black labor union, animal welfare association—American Humane Society, and African American to serve on the Supreme Court—Thurgood Marshall. Johns Hopkins, adopting the German model, was the first research university and Henrietta Lacks, an African American woman from Baltimore, without her consent, provided the cancer cells that became the HeLa immortal cell line used by cancer researchers worldwide.

Today Baltimore continues to make history as a vital center for the performing arts, five Fortune 1000 companies, the filming of the award winning television series, *The Wire*, and a plethora of movies from *Sleepless in Seattle* to *Silence of the Lambs*. It is the home of famous film director, John Waters, the National Aquarium, the football contender, the Ravens, and a Major League baseball team, the Orioles, who play in the architecturally beautiful Camden Yards. The site of the 2012 NRHC Conference, Baltimore calls us to be movers and shakers, to locate ourselves amid diversity and forge new and vibrant ways to connect and to sustain life through science, literature, social science, business, education, art and culture. Only amid opposing forces can creativity abound.

City as Text Explorations

9:30 am – 1:30pm

- ☞ **Charles Village and Station North Arts and Entertainment District:** Station North is an emergent arts and entertainment cultural center located three miles north of our Conference site. This eclectic neighborhood includes Greenmount Cemetery—a resting place for many famous Baltimoreans; The Great Blacks In Wax Museum; Maryland Institute College of Art; Wyman Park Dell; and the Baltimore Museum of Art, which is located on the Johns Hopkins Campus. Students will take the free Circulator bus to Penn Station, which is located at southern edge Station North.
- ☞ **Federal Hill:** This beautiful 19th Century historic neighborhood is located just south of our Conference site. The Maryland Science Center and Rash Field are located at the foot of this neighborhood. Federal Hill Park, the famous Cross Street Market, and many art venues and fashion boutique stores can be visited. This area of Baltimore includes the waterfront and is also near the American Visionary Museum and Baltimore Museum of Industry. You can also visit Fort McHenry by renting a bike or taking the Baltimore Circulator Bus.
- ☞ **Fells Point:** This 18th Century historic waterfront can be reached by water taxi. Baltimore African American maritime history is encountered at the Frederick Douglas–Isaac Myers Maritime Park. Fells Point is also where historic Baltimore intersects pop culture Baltimore. If you decide to walk to this neighborhood, you will pass the entrance to Little Italy and experience Baltimore’s newest urban development project: Inner Harbor East.
- ☞ **Port Authority of Baltimore-Environmental Excursion to Hart Miller Island:** Hart Miller Island is located off the western shore of the Chesapeake Bay in Essex, MD. Participants will take a bus and boat ride to reach the Island. Students will have hands-on experiences exploring how the Port of Baltimore manages the health of the Chesapeake Bay. Water testing, fish ecology, bird watching, and wetlands management science are included in this experience.

- ☞ **Little Italy:** Little Italy is located across the Inner Harbor due east of our Conference site. Before you reach this Italian enclave, you will pass the State of Maryland’s 9/11 Memorial at the World Trade Tower, The Power Plant entertainment venues, and the Baltimore Aquarium. The north edge of Little Italy includes the Star Spangled Banner Flag House and the Reginald F. Lewis of Maryland African American History and Culture Museum. You definitely should plan on eating lunch here!
- ☞ **Mount Vernon:** Walking north on Charles Street, Mount Vernon is located in the center of Baltimore. Mount Vernon Square architecture, park, and cultural institutions are beautiful examples of 19th Century Baltimore culture. The Peabody Conservatory, The Walters Art Museum, and The Maryland Historical Society are just a few of the many cultural institutions that can be encountered in this neighborhood. Baltimore’s free Circulator bus or the Light Rail Train transportation can be taken to reach this walking tour site.
- ☞ **West Baltimore:** This walking tour experience will be a unique one because participants will experience the best of Baltimore’s civic development, Oriole Park at Camden Yards and Shab Row “dollar houses,” as well as the remnants of its 1968 riots. Your route destination is the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Museum, the first roundhouse built in the United States. This meandering tour also includes walking through Pig Town and past the Edgar Allen Poe House. We recommend that as you head back to the Conference site you eat lunch at the “famous” Lexington Market (the oldest continually running market in the United States) and stop by Edgar Allen Poe’s tomb. You will most likely seek out light rail transportation or take the Circulator bus back to the hotel because this walking tour is longest.

Competing Claims: Divisions and Coalitions conference keynote speaker is architect Klaus Philipsen. Mr. Philipsen emigrated from Stuttgart, Germany, to the United States in 1988. His Baltimore-based architecture office is best known for its urban planning accomplishments.

ArchPlan [<http://www.archplan.com>] project portfolio features projects that facilitate suburban and urban communities' imagining their "future selves." A recent project of note is the Baltimore Red Line Corridor and Station Area planning program. Klaus's office is currently developing a master plan for an entertainment center located near Druid Hill Park at Pennsylvania & North Avenues. This

community anchor project includes building a museum for the Negro League Baseball Association and renovating the "famous" Sphinx Club.

Mr. Philipsen is also a community stakeholder; he is an active blogger and sits on many community executive boards; most notably, he is the chairman of Baltimore's D: Center. Klaus's social media profile includes this description: Always Searching.
